## **Background**

Child Y was a 4 year old child when they were removed from their Mother's care and placed with their Father on a Care Order. The Local Authority was the Corporate Parent. Child Y had been described as 'bright and chatty' and had made good developmental progress.

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## **Safeguarding Concerns**

Safeguarding concerns were reported from pre-birth but Child Y was never subject to a child protection plan or pre-proceedings. That meant that other professionals were not aware of those safeguarding concerns when they began work with the family.

Child Y had a complicated life having experienced neglect, significant instability and loss, exposed to adults taking drugs and to violence.

### 02 The Incident

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While living with their father and his family. Child Y was living with several step siblings. The partner of Child Y's father became pregnant and prior to the birth Child Y and some of the other siblings went to live with her Mother. This was not assessed or approved. Before and after the birth the school reported a number of safeguarding concerns inc. bruises and scratches, foraging for food, falling asleep in class and absences.

A child protection medical found that Child Y had approximately 18 bruises on their body and face. Medical opinion was that 'the majority of bruises were likely to be non-accidental'

### 06 Recommendations

- Professionals need to know the restrictions of a police 'safe and well' check and how their service provides a follow up response.
- Professionals should understand the impact that parental substance use can have on children.
- Placement with parents must be better monitored and receive multi-agency support.
- Pre-birth assessment work needs to be improved

**The Review**


How effectively agencies worked together with Child Y and their family to assess and review the suitability and safety of the placement, and its changing circumstances, and manage any

The extent to which professional thinking and decision-making was influenced by the fact that Child Y was the subject of a care order and placed with their father?



There was a good assessment of Child Y's needs. However, there was a lack of multi-agency working or coordinated plan that addressed the vulnerabilities of the placement or Child Y's emotional needs. Partners did not understand the changing circumstances for Child Y and the impact that they were having.

Some professionals considered the 'placement with parent' to be safe because it was an order granted by the court. Child Y did not receive the level of support that should normally be afforded to a
