Online training courses for school staff

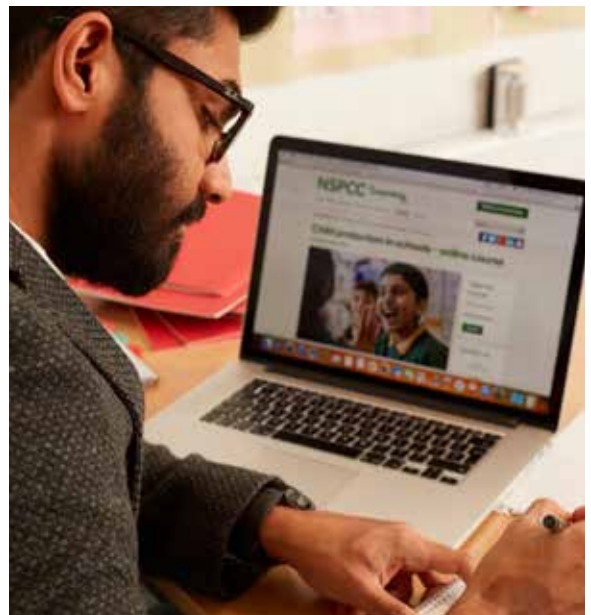
Developed by the NSPCC in association with the Ann Craft Trust, our 3-hour course will help you to better understand your role in safeguarding young people or young adults at risk from abuse, neglect or harm.

Safer recruitment in education

This 4-hour course is for anyone responsible for recruiting, shortlisting and vetting the right people to work with children in schools or colleges.

Face-to-face training courses for school staff

Our face-to-face training courses take place across the country, all led by specialist child protection experts. They will guide you through a structured, interactive course tailored to suit a variety of learning styles. You'll also meet others working with young people, giving you the chance to work together to share ideas, experiences and learning. Prices start at £225.

Introduction to safeguarding and child protection

Our 1-day course will give you a clear understanding of how to recognise, report and record concerns about a child's welfare.

Safer recruitment in education

Recruit safely with our 1-day course for anyone working in education, or recruiting for roles in the education sector.

Designated safeguarding lead for schools and colleges in England (and refresher course)

Introduction to safeguarding d/Deaf and disabled children

This 1-day introductory course will improve your awareness, knowledge and understanding of the additional barriers, assumptions and attitudes that may impact the safety of d/Deaf and disabled children and young people.



We also offer 1-day training sessions led by NSPCC practitioners.

For all school staff who come into contact with children, including teachers, teaching assistants and safeguarding leads (please be aware that these workshops require completion of an NSPCC eLearning package prior to the session):

- Harmful Sexual Behaviour (HSB) primary school workshop
- HSB secondary school workshop
- HSB special education needs workshop

For a multi-agency audience (participants do not need any prior knowledge of the issues but would benefit from general safeguarding knowledge):

- Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) foundation workshop
- Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) foundation workshop
- Neglect training workshop

Guidance on Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

Relationship education for primary school children, and relationship and sex education for secondary school pupils has been introduced as compulsory in all schools as of September 2021.

At the NSPCC, we believe comprehensive and inclusive education on relationships and sex is of vital importance – and our free lesson plans and resources can help your school deliver a high-quality programme of teaching on this crucial topic. This should be supported by a whole-school approach which champions peer respect and encourages help-seeking for any worries or concerns.



Why does RSE play a key role in schools?

- From the most recent UK-wide prevalence study, we know that one in five children has experienced severe maltreatment, and further child protection research suggests that roughly a third of all child sexual abuse is perpetrated by other children.
- We know that education programmes can improve children's understanding of what constitutes abuse or inappropriate behaviour, and can also increase the likelihood of young people coming forward to disclose experience of abuse.
- Evidence from research carried out with over 16s found that those who participated in these programmes were more likely to feel that the timing of when they first had sex was right and that both partners were equally willing, than those who did not.

Universal services

Speak out. Stay safe.

Our *Speak Out. Stay Safe.* programme is for children in key stage 1 and 2 (ages 5-11). The programme includes child-friendly, interactive assemblies and workshops, delivered by specially trained staff and volunteers who help children:

- understand abuse in all its forms and recognise the signs of abuse
- understand that abuse is never a child's fault, and they have the right to be safe
- know how to get help, and the sources of help available to them, including our Childline service.

Childline

If a child at your school is worried about anything, they can always talk to Childline: the UK's free 24-hour helpline and online service for anyone under 19.

Children and young people can contact Childline about any worry, whether it's big or small – from abuse and bullying to exam stress and relationships. They can get in touch with a trained counsellor over the phone, by email or through our 1-2-1 online chat.

Young people can also access the Childline website, which provides advice on a huge range of topics, plus a space for peer support on the message boards. There's also a section designed for children under 12, where they can receive age-appropriate advice, play games, visit the 'Calm zone' and create art.

Targeted services

Children's Services

Seeking Solutions

One-on-one support for children and young people in key stage 2-5 (ages 7-19) to support them to deal with problems affecting their life, happiness or well-being.

In Ctrl

A group work programme for children and young people aged 9-13 who may be more vulnerable to online sexual abuse. In Ctrl aims to reduce the risk of online sexual abuse by increasing children's digital resilience – helping them to stay safe online.

Protect and Respect - awareness raising

The awareness raising group work programme provides a safe and reflective space for young people aged 11-19 to learn about healthy relationships and consent.

As well as delivering services in schools, there are some services which schools can refer pupils to:

- **Family Focus** - an assessment that helps staff working with families to understand the types of issues families are facing, and determine what support they might need.
- **Letting the Future In** - a therapeutic support service to empower young people who have been sexually abused, to recover and rebuild their lives.
- **National Clinical Assessment and Treatment Service (NCATS)** - assessment, treatment, consultation and training for and about children and young people who display harmful sexual behaviour.
- **Protect and Respect - support and protection** - tailored support for the child and their parent or carer where there are concerns that a child or young person is experiencing exploitation.
- **Turn the Page** - a service to help children and young people overcome feelings that have made them display harmful sexual behaviour.

Talk PANTS is a simple conversation to help keep children safe from sexual abuse. From P through to S, each letter of PANTS provides a simple but valuable rule that can help children understand what abuse is and how to speak out about it.
